Project Spotlight: Southampton Village Residence with Piet Oudolph



This stunning new residence designed by the Belgian architect Vincent Van Duysen is situated on a flagpole lot which consists of 2.99 acres and backs up to Coopers Neck Pond in the Village of Southampton. As part of a multi-disciplinary team, Araiys Design prepared site planning, grading and drainage plans, as well as wetland buffer design and served as the local landscape architect for the world renown Dutch garden designer Piet Oudolf. Araiys has been assisting Mr. Oudolf for the past four years with design and planning of further augmentation of the wetland buffer as well as upland site plantings and garden rooms. Our staff has had the pleasure of attending many nursery trips with Piet to tag plants as well working with him on site to lay out the gardens. 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PLANTS OF THE SEASON

Native Plants Of The Season

Common Name: Blue false Indigo

Scientific Name: Baptisia australis

Baptisia australis, commonly called as Blue False Indigo, is a herbaceous perennial with robust and upright habit. It branches extensively and forms a bush at maturity. Blue false can reach 3' to 4' wide and tall. It thrives in full sun to partial shade in average, dry to medium, and well-drained soil. Indigo-blue flower spikes arise above the bluish-green foliage in late spring and early summer. Seed pods appears in summer and turn into charcoal black color when ripe. Blue false indigo makes a excellent statement as a specimen, perennial border, or naturalized in prairies and meadows.



Common Name: Purple Coneflower Scientific Name: Echinacea purpurea 'Magnus',

Echinacea purpurea 'Magnus', commonly known as Purple Coneflower which provides long midsummer blooms. 'Magnus' typically grows to 2-3' tall and wide. It thrives in well drained soils and prefers full sun to partial shade, but once established it is tolerant of drought conditions and heat. This species features with showy flowers with pink petals that surround a large brown central cone. Blooming starts from late summer and can keep coming into September. 'Magnus' is perfect for massing at the back of a perennial border, meadow, or wildlife garden.



Ornamental Plants Of the Season

Common Name: Chaste Tree Scientific Name: Vitex agnus-castus

Vitex agnus-castus, commonly known as Chaste tree, is a spreading deciduous shrub or trained as a multi-trunk small tree with large clusters and fragrant blooms in summer. It typically grows to 8-10' tall and 5-8' wide, demonstrating a vase shape in maturity. Chaste tree prefers medium moisture and well-drained soils in full sun. Lilac-colored flowers which is attractive to butterflies and bees appears in 12" long panicles in July to August. It is good to be used as shrub borders, foundation planting, cottage gardens, or butterflies garden or as a specimen plant.



Common Name: Endless Summer Hydrangea Scientific Name: Hydrangea marcrophylla 'Endless Summer'

Hydrangea marcrophylla 'Endless Summer', commonly called as Endless Summer Hydrangea, is a flowering shrub which can bloom all summer long. It typically grows 3' to 5' tall and wide with a compacted and rounded habit display. Endless Summer Hydrangea thrives in moist but well -drained soil and prefers full to partial shade. Flowers bloom in June to September. Flowers color depends on the pH of the soils, ranging from blue in acid soils and pink in alkaline. This species is a good specimen or mass planting for shrub borders, foundations, or hedge planting.

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
